We are all disciples of Christ and, as disciples, we are challenged to encounter our brothers and sisters, so that they may come to know Jesus Christ. Cursillo should not be a "well-kept secret." ## **Inspiration Corner**

#### The Greatest Search

The other day, I had the occasion to watch the movie, *The Three Musketeers*, on television. (I had missed it whenever it came out on screen.) In one scene, one of the musketeers claims that the most important and most difficult effort in life is our search for our self.

At about the same time in history that *The Three Musketeers* was written, a philosophical reflection on that same topic was taking place, by another Frenchman, Rene Descartes. Descartes wondered: could it be proven that our ego exists? He was the first to claim that he had proved that our self exists. When, after eliminating everything else that could pretend to be our self, he came upon a statement that he considered to be clear, distinct and true, namely "I think, therefore I am."

If we want to go to the next step, and know for sure that we each have an immortal soul, then the best place to find the answer is in prayer. When I pray, I am in contact with God. I can experience God's presence. I can realize when those prayers are answered.

That powerful experience of being in contact with the infinite creator of the universe, when you come to think of it, says that we have been in contact with God. We can communicate with God. Something within us can both send messages to, and receive them from, our infinite, transcendent God. If I can pray, then there is a part of me that can enter the infinite life of heaven.

At all our Cursillo weekends, we keep a picture of Jesus easily visible. That can remind us of our prayer relationship with God, and lead us to an ever deeper relationship with God.

Joseph Ratzinger (before he was Pope Benedict) once described his vision of the moment after our death. He believed that that we will see the face of the risen, ascended Christ. This face will be so utterly beautiful that we will regret all our sins, and be purified for our entrance into heaven. How long that purification will take, will be different for each person.

The important fact is that we will be *alive*: not our body; but our soul which exists and is spiritual and made capable of entering into eternity by sharing Christ's life.

This Lent, I encourage you to search for your soul. You'll discover it in prayer. When you discern God's response to your prayers, then you will know you sent a message to the infinite and received a response. That should make your Lent a very special time. You would have discovered your real self, your soul. And that's surely a cause for total joy!

What Palanca is.... and What it is Not By Deacon Bill Jacobs

On the three-day Cursillo weekend, we are introduced to the concept of Palanca in the *Actual Grace* rollo, which is the second clergy rollo on Friday of the weekend. If you are like me, hearing about the palanca that is being offered on behalf of the candidates, from Cursillistas all over the world, is immensely powerful. But how well do we understand palanca? Perhaps by understanding it better, we can make palanca a more integral part of our Cursillo walk.

Palanca IS—prayers and sacrifices, offered for the spiritual and apostolic successes of the Movement.

Palanca IS NOT-colorful posters, banners, flowers, or good wishes.

Palanca IS NOT—a letter which is read aloud on the weekend, or sent to an individual candidate. The important part is not the letter, but the prayers and sacrifices which we document *in* the letter; the letter is merely a vehicle with which we convey the palanca that we have done.

Palanca IS—truly sacrificial in character, an effort above and beyond the routine.

Palanca IS NOT—simply offering up for the Cursillo the personal piety which we already do. If you always go to an extra Mass every Saturday, offering it up for Cursillo is not palanca; attending an additional weekday Mass at an inconvenient time or place could be palanca.

Palanca IS NOT—limited to the few weeks or months before a Three-Day Weekend. Think about the many needs that the Movement has at other times of the year—the Secretariat and guidance in their decision making, the Fourth Day Workshops and their success, the Ultreyas, the continuation of Group Reunions around the diocese. One might measure the vibrancy of a diocesan Cursillo community by the commitments of its members to ongoing palanca.

Palanca IS—or should be—a way of life for every cursillista. When prayers and sacrifices are offered, we unlock the infinite treasuries of God's grace. Our movement is transformed. Lives are changed, not only the lives of those for whom we pray, but our own lives as well.

Bishop Hervas, in the original Leader's Manual, said, "We should have the intimate and absolute conviction that everything in the Cursillo is the work of God's grace." Through our palanca, our prayers and our sacrificial spirit, we tap into that grace. And remember what the Lord said to Saint Paul: "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." (2 Cor 12:9)

# What is a Cursillo de Cursillo?

Lois Schering and Angela Feltz attended a Cursillo de Cursillo weekend September 25-28, 2014 at St Bernard's Abbey in Cullman, Alabama. It was a great weekend, and everyone there learned much about the Cursillo Movement. Like a Cursillo weekend (a short course in Christianity), the Cursillo de Cursillo is a short course on the Foundational Charism of the Cursillo Movement. This weekend was designed by Eduardo Bonin, to help Cursillistas learn about the Cursillo Charism.

A Cursillo de Cursillo weekend begins on Thursday evening with the first of five meditations. There is daily Mass and an opportunity for the Sacrament of Reconciliation, and, like the Cursillo weekend, fifteen Rollos. There are table discussions, and a summary by the table secretary. While there were Rollos, teaching about the Cursillo movement, there is also much time to nurture encounters with self, Christ and others. If you have attended the School of Leaders or 4<sup>th</sup> Day Workshops, you have heard an introduction into some of the topics of a Cursillo de Cursillo. These topics are expanded upon, for a deeper understanding of the Cursillo Movement as a charism of Friendship. We had the opportunity to Make a Friend and Be a Friend, allowing the Cursillo de Cursillo to form us, transform us and send us, like the 72 disciples, to go out and, through friendship, to bring others to Christ.

While at St Bernard Abbey in Cullman, Lois renewed a friendship, with someone she knew when she lived in Huntsville 27 years ago. They also renewed a friendship with a deacon they met in New York, at the National Encounter a few years ago.
