The first bishop of Nashville was a Dominican, Richard Pius Miles. The diocese encompassed the entire state of Tennessee until 1970, when the Diocese of Memphis was established. The Diocese of Knoxville was established in 1988.

The episcopal see of the Diocese of Nashville is currently vacant, since the death of Bishop David Chodby on June 3, 2017, at the age of 70.

The Director's Chair

Building on a Firm Foundation

I hope that you ALL are having a good Summer!

As your Lay Director, it is my responsibility to make sure that we are on track as a Cursillo Movement. This means staying within our National, Regional and Diocese By-Laws. We have had, in recent years, difficulty filling English Men's (and sometimes Women's) Teams for the weekends. We have also struggled sponsoring enough candidates to hold a weekend. Because of this we have had to make last minute decisions whether to hold or reschedule the weekend. This puts unnecessary pressure on the Team, and causes anxiety for the Candidates.

The Secretariat has come up with a solution. We had a meeting this June 18, and are all in agreement with what we can do to alleviate these situations in the future. First, we will not have Rectors and Rectoras start Team Formation until we have at least 10 candidates on hand, before Team Formation begins. And second, if the Rector or Rectora does not have a complete Team in place by the first Team Formation Meeting we will cancel that weekend and have a Cursillo Workshop instead. The workshop would be a one day event on the Saturday that the weekend was scheduled, if possible.

One Workshop that we are planning will be on Sponsoring. WE NEED CANDIDATES if we want Cursillo to move forward.....NOW is the time to sponsor a Candidate!

Another Workshop that we are planning is a CDC Workshop (Cursillo De Cursillo). The CDC is for all Cursillistas. It is a 3 day Cursillo-style weekend, put on by the Regional and National Service Teams and others who have made a CDC in the past. Several of our present and past Secretariat members have attended a CDC Workshop and can attest to its benefits. The CDC is a course on the Foundational Charism of Cursillo, for those who are searching for something beyond the Cursillo Weekend. It was developed by Eduardo Bonnin who was the founder of the Cursillo Movement.

We have set the dates for these Workshops: August 5th will be the Sponsoring Workshop, and September 28 – October 1 are the dates for the CDC. As of June 18, the Men's English Team did not have a full Team nor enough applications (we had 5) to hold a weekend on August 3rd. Also, the Women's English Team was short Team Members, and had only 3 applications. Therefore, we will reschedule these two Weekends. At the Secretariat Meeting on July 15, we talked about setting dates for next years activities (2018) and will advise you when the dates are set.

The Spanish Cursillo Men's Weekend is set for August 31-September 3 and the Women's Spanish is set for November 16-19.

It is time to pray and do Palanca for our Cursillo Movement. We must remember that Cursillo is a Movement of the Holy Spirit. I ask for your prayers for, not only me as your Lay Director, but for the whole Secretariat.

I recently visited New Orleans and its surroundings as a participant in a meeting of the Catholic Alumni Clubs, International. The twenty clubs gather each year in a different scenic point in America. Last week, we travelled to Louisiana and Mississippi. What amazed me the most was our visit to Natchez.

In taking a rather thorough tour of the city, both day and night, in all its parts, talking to lots of people in all sorts of professions, I have never visited people so happy and proud of their home town. Then we all began to realize a factor we had not hitherto recognized: the city was overwhelmingly Catholic. Over the years, Catholics had set the moral compass for the city, and gave it a mentality that was of the highest order. This formed the atmosphere of safety and belonging that made all its citizens proud to live together. That melding includes blacks and whites, as well as Christians and a significant number of Jews. All seem to live and work well together. The streets are clean and the sidewalks are safe.

The question that quickly jumped into my mind was, “How could this have come about?” One answer came to me as we walked around the main section of town, where the Court House stands as well as most ornate governmental buildings. There are both a Cathedral and a Basilica among those structures. I later found out they are both well attended. The Catholics in town lead the way in living their faith and spreading the love that they receive at Eucharist to all their neighbors.

They are living the values of Cursillo. They have standards and values that show in their everyday lives that inspire others to follow them. I have now briefly experienced that method at work. In that city, for over 200 years (many of which were challenging), Cursillo-style methodology has proven effective. It’s only starting here. Let’s make our start strong in our towns, and let future visitors to *our* hometowns marvel at what we have accomplished.

LEARNING OUR ABC'S

This month, all of our children and grandchildren are back in school. Toni and I remember this time fondly from when my sons were small. (Remember that Office Depot commercial where the father was joyfully back-to-school shopping, with the song in the background, “The Most Wonderful Time of the Year”?)

Some of the early part of each school year involves reviewing concepts from the previous year (the children might have forgotten these over summer vacation). For all of us cursillistas, this might be a good time for us to review our own “ABCs of Cursillo.”

A IS FOR ACTIVE—If we are to call ourselves cursillistas, we must remain active in all aspects of our movement. It is not enough to only live our lives according to Cursillo principles, as valuable as that is. We must be active in attending our weekly group reunion (or find one!). We must be active in attending our ultreya monthly. We must actively grow in our faith and knowledge of the movement by attending the Fourth Day Workshop.

B IS FOR BIBLE—So many of us seek new and interesting things to claim as our study. Much of the new literature in Catholic circles has a lot to teach us about new ideas for evangelization. But we must never, never neglect our Bible reading and Bible study. Remember that line from the weekend, “Don’t just read good books, read the best books.” The Sacred Scriptures are the ultimate “best book!”

C IS FOR CHARISM—Our Cursillo Movement is seeking to deepen our understanding of Cursillo by reflecting more deeply on the foundational charism that is Cursillo. This can happen by studying Cursillo documents. We are also offered the great privilege, this September, of hosting a 3-day weekend called Cursillo de Cursillo, where these fundamental charisms will be discussed and explored. Sign up today!

Let us reflect upon where we are in our personal spiritual walk. It is also time to reflect on the direction in which Cursillo is headed. MEET OUR LEADERS

Tell us about your background in the faith.

I grew up going to the Methodist church. Church was an important part of my life growing up. Most of my family's closest friends were members of our church. For the Children's Sermon, our Pastor did something called, "What's in your pocket?" Kids would bring things to him and he could make a Bible connection to anything!! Parents used to plant things on their kids to try and trip him up, but he could always do it! Honestly, that made me want to go to church each week to see what the Pastor would talk about. When I went to college, I went to University Congregational Church because it was close to campus. I didn't really participate much. However, I competed in gymnastics at the University of Washington, and there was a strong contingent of Christians in our Gymnastics Conference throughout the Pacific Northwest. These 2 things laid the groundwork for my love of Jesus. Through them, I gained Bible knowledge, deepened my faith, and my prayer life grew. At my ex-husband's request, Bob, the boys and I began attending a Lutheran church. I joined the Lutheran Church and began to appreciate the tradition of the church. My daughter Ailis was born and then baptized Lutheran. After Bob and I divorced, I reconnected with an old high school friend in Knoxville—my now husband, Dan. He attended Sacred Heart Cathedral, and when I would visit him, I attended church with him. I fell in love with the Catholic faith!! All of what I had learned in my previous years seemed to be fulfilled in Catholic belief. I was drawn to the tradition and how sacred everything seemed to be. I loved the Mass and couldn't wait to learn more about Catholicism. I began attending RCIA classes and continued to see how everything I had previously heard about the Catholic faith was not really true. Finally... after my annulment was complete, I joined the Catholic church and my marriage to Dan was convalidated! I continue to grow in my love for my Catholic faith.

What do you remember most about your Cursillo weekend?

What I remember most about my Cursillo weekend was a sense of love and joy. People seemed to love the Lord and want to serve Him. I also love the Mass, Adoration, the Rosary... it all came alive on the weekend. I returned home with such a sense of reverence for being in front of Jesus that I hadn't had before! There was so much information, it was honestly a little overwhelming. But the love and joy of everyone was so infectious. I knew I wanted to keep that going, and was excited to hear about group reunion! I also remember the Divine Mercy picture at the end of the hallway right before entering into the Rollo room. That image, and the words, "Jesus, I trust in you" made a huge impact on me. I returned home dedicated to praying the Divine Mercy Chaplet everyday.

How do you understand your role in the Secretariat?

In my role as Secretary, I feel a sense of responsibility to make sure the information we discuss is accurately recorded and given out. I am grateful for people like Lois Schering and Angie Feltz who guide me in the areas I am not as familiar with and help me with corrections. I also see my role as helper to Dick Shriver, the Lay Director. When we have ideas, we are able to bounce them off of each other. I feel like we have a great working relationship and have the same vision to move the movement forward.

How do you envision our Cursillo movement advancing in faith and holiness?

I believe our Cursillo Movement will advance in faith and holiness as we allow the Holy Spirit to guide us. If we use the lessons we were taught on our weekend of "make a friend, be a friend, bring a friend to Christ," and "Not everyone is good for everything, but everyone is good for something," we will move forward, trusting in the Holy Spirit's guidance on who to invite to weekends. Using piety, study and action as our tools for personal growth, we will see how to reach out to our friends and sponsor people who will also grow in the love for the Movement. Friendship and Self Image

The following is a summary of the talk given at the School of Leaders/Fourth Day Workshop on June 17, 2017.

On our Cursillo Weekend our first meditation was “Know Yourself.” As we look at our self-image, we think of how it is influenced by our circle of friends. St Augustine even prayed to “let me know myself that I may know You better. “ Did you know that our friends can define our self-image? Just like the saying we often hear about Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, “You become who you consume.” Jesus dwells in you and you in Him. You become the Hands and Feet and the Voice of Christ in the world. And if I spend time with Jesus, I become more like Jesus. Friendship is like that.

Let’s come up with some adjectives to describe ourselves – intelligent, friendly, helpful, compassionate... Let’s go deeper now – Am I loving? Is my life worth living? Do I feel like I belong somewhere? Would I be missed if I were gone? We can answer these questions with a simple “Yes or No.” But the answers are not that simple. We are who we know. Our friendship with others makes us who we are. How others think of us helps us to determine how we think of ourselves. What about our children? They have to learn from others to develop a self image because they are dependent on others to learn. The love of a parent will teach the child to be a loving person. As we age, this dependence will not be as important in our lives, but it will still be there. We rely on our “friends” to help us with our self- image.

Where should I go when I want to know things like “Does my life have meaning ?”--- to the experts! I go to the “wise” as we read in the Scriptures, and Greek philosophers like Socrates. We look to ones who know the meaning of life. They understand what true greatness is. As Socrates said, “they understand what is important in life and live accordingly, which is to say that they live a virtuous life”. So we go to the wise, our friends who have the characteristics of “True Friendship.” “They love us for ‘our’ own sake”. Is that not just what Jesus wants us to do? The author, John Cuddeback says, “A true friend is the most apt to help us form a true self image.” What is a TRUE FRIEND? A true friend is a person who really knows you. A true friend is a person you have entrusted with your deepest secrets. They see you where “you” are and help you to see yourself at that moment. They gain nothing except what is the “Best” for you! They see what you can be. A True Friend can help reveal to us things that we cannot see on our own. A True Friend has a love for you that gives them insight into you.

In his book, Mr. Cuddeback has this Latin phrase, “Ubi Amor, Ibi Oculus” – Where there is Love, There is power to see. Love produces insight. With Love you can see beyond the skin of a person and see their inner most being. You can see them for themselves, not for what they can do for you! You can forgive and be forgiven with Love. They see their failures; you see them as just falling short of what you know they can be. Love helps our true friends to see us as we truly are. The True Friend shows us the truth about ourselves that we cannot see on our own. They can help us to see that we are loveable, created in the image and likeness of God. We are loved by Jesus the Good Shepherd, who gave His life for each and every person. We must continually strive to see God’s love for us. We must enter into Divine Providence. God has always loved us, but we must accept that we are loved by others. When we achieve this, we, through supernatural Grace, come to realize that we are “Loved by God.” God’s Grace can overcome everything, even our self-doubt. We are continually building on a foundation based on Love and God’s Grace.

How others treat us has a factor on our self-image. Looking at the three-day Cursillo weekend, the message we portray to the candidates is “God Loves You”. Mr. Cuddeback explains to us that, through Divine Providence, the candidate will come to understand that love of God, with the assistance of Supernatural Grace. God has called each of them to the weekend and has showered them all with his love. God uses love to help us realize his love for us. By showing a person your love for them they will grow to realize and see how much God loves them.

In true human friendship we come to know who we are in our self image. We learn that we are lovable. We are worthy of Friendship with others. We are worthy of being affirmed in our actions. We should appreciate the presence of other humans in our life. We should choose our friends wisely because bad friends will cause a bad self-image; just as true friends will give you a good self-image. Bad friends will draw you away from a truly good and virtuous life. They will encourage you in things you should not do, and discourage you from things that are good. We come to the 4th Day Workshop to grow and to share what is fundamental to being a Christian. We share our tripod of piety, study and action, and our hopes of becoming a better person. How many of you have family or friends who do not understand why you go to church so often, or why you come to the 4th Day Workshop? They do not desire virtue but we must love them anyway. As true friends we want the best for them; that is God's love for them, that they will grow to understand through our love for them. If we want a virtuous life for them we must begin with prayer, and sometimes that is all we can do. Since we want what is best for our friends, we must ask God to lead them to the virtuous life. If they reject that, then we continue to love them and pray that God’s will be done in their lives.

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Cursillo de Cursillos - Opportunities & Benefits

Cursillo de Cursillos, what is it? Simply stated, it is a *course* on the Foundational Charism of Cursillo for Cursillistas who are searching for something *beyond* the Cursillo Weekend course. In order to help Cursillistas with a thorough knowledge of the Charism, a special course called Cursillo de Cursillos was developed by Eduardo Bonnín.

Cursillo de Cursillos is a course that has provided Cursillistas with a treasure of knowledge and a living experience of what is essential in the mentality, purpose, and methodology of the Movement. The course is offered to those Cursillistas who have the desire *to be* effective Christian leaders. This course has provided many Cursillistas with an opportunity to discover the immense possibilities that Cursillo has to offer the person and the Church.

Cursillo de Cursillos has helped many Cursillistas delve into the technical elements of the Movement in light of its Charism. This course uses a schedule and format similar to the Cursillo Weekend. The course begins on Thursday evening and concludes on Sunday evening. A total of 13 Rollos and 4 Meditations are presented by a team of laity and clergy. Each Rollo presented is followed by a discussion within each 'decuria' or table group. Sufficient time is allotted for questions and answers at the end of each Rollo. Each day creates a different environment in and through the participation of the Cursillistas in friendship. The weekend provides a relaxing atmosphere with plenty of time for breaks, reflection, personal contact, and daily Eucharist. Besides an increased knowledge of the Charism of Cursillo, the participants have enjoyed the opportunity to strengthen and renew friendships, make new friends, share and learn from each other's personal experiences in discipleship and leadership. Cursillistas have also enjoyed the opportunity to nurture and deepen the three essential encounters with self, Christ, and others that were discovered during the Cursillo Weekend. Similar to the Cursillo Weekend, the Cursillo de Cursillos must be a personal experience in order to take advantage of its opportunities and benefits.

Cursillistas have responded enthusiastically to the truth and simplicity of Cursillo in light of its Charism and through God's grace, they are inspired to return to their School of Leaders, Ultreyas, and environments to live, witness, and communicate the Good News that God loves us to people they encounter. This inspiration or response is evident in the Cursillistas as they listen, reflect, share, and freely embrace the true Charism of Cursillo!

To-date, Cursillo de Cursillos is the most effective course available for Cursillistas wanting to learn about the Foundational Charism. The goal of Cursillo is to communicate God's love through friendship in the moveable square meter where God has placed us at this exact moment. Make the decision today to attend a Cursillo de Cursillos and allow the Charism to form you, inform you, and transform you. Christ is still counting on you!

The Secretariat will vote on the proposed Apostolic Plan at the 1st Secretariat meeting following this publishing of the *Rooster Crows*.

The following are the changes. **Note that the words in blue will be struck out and the words in red will be added:**

1st page – Change **Pastoral Plan** to **Apostolic Plan**

2nd page – remove **4th day workshop** from Table of Contents

3rd page – under Vision Statement --
revised articles of operation issued by The National Secretariat Office **in on**
November **7, 2012. 2015.**

4th page – under Pre Cursillo Short Term plans-- **Organize a Prayer Service / Rosary Service on Thursday evening for sponsors as they drop off their candidates at the Cursillo weekend. Sponsors visit the Chapel before leaving by auditorium door.**
Have Sponsor workshops twice a year.

Under Pre Cursillo Long Term Plans-- Coordinate with the Office of **Adult Christian Living Christian Adult Formation** and the Office of Hispanic Ministry for the Diocese of Knoxville to target environments and populations.

5th page – under Three Day Cursillo Short Term plans-- In cooperation with the Spiritual **Director Advisor**, insure that the presentations given on the Weekend are orthodox and accurately reflect the mind of the Church and Cursillo Literature.

6th page – under Three Day Cursillo Long Term plans-- **Conduct Spanish language (only) Cursillos.**

Under PostCursillo Objectives-- To bring about Christian transformation of environments using the Cursillo method of **Holiness, Formation and Evangelization. Piety, Study and Action.**

To foster encouragement and perseverance primarily through Group Reunion and Ultreya, and **secondarily** through the School of Leaders.

Under PostCursillo Short Term plans, remove **Replace Parish Representative Coordinator (current Coordinator is studying for Permanent Diaconate).** Establish a position on the Secretariat for a Spanish Post Cursillo Representative.

Under PostCursillo Long Term plans-- Add **at least one five** more Ultreyas in the diocese, **one Ultreya for each deanery (English & Spanish).**

Finding a retreat center to hold Cursillos **in the Knoxville area more conveniently located in the diocese.**

7th page – School of Leaders – remove term also known as 4th day workshop under School of Leaders Short Term plans--
Establish Maintain a record of those attending the School of Leaders and share this information with the Cursillo coordinator and the Secretariat. **Establish Maintain** the School of Leaders format of Leaders Group Reunion, Doctrinal Study, Techniques Study, Section reports, Briefing on Current Cursillo Information and final prayer and visitation of the Blessed Sacrament.

Under School of Leaders Long Term plans-- Develop a format to go from meeting every other month to monthly School of Leaders **by forming a Bi-lingual committee to discuss the feasibility of having monthly 4th Day workshops.**

9th page – under Appendix A, Revision History add revision **9 - Updated the name of the Plan and the revision date in the Vision Statement. Removed the short and long term goals that have been completed and added future goals in the PreCursillo, Cursillo, Post-Cursillo and School of Leaders areas.**
