e-vangelization

Just about every way of communicating or conducting business has been bestowed the prefix of "e-" to indicate that the Internet has been utilized as another option for transferring information. e-vangelization, or spreading the Word electronically is the latest addition.

The Catholic Cursillo of the Diocese of Knoxville will be taking up residence along the information superhighway at www.knoxvillecursillo.org. We hope to have our website in operation in the Spring of next year. We intend to keep the design simple and informative. Information about the School of Leaders, Ultreyas, Weekends, announcements, applications and a host of other information will be available. We will not post names or other personal information.

We will also try to start moving all our mailings from the very expensive USPS "snail-mail" to the much less expensive and faster e-mail. Right now it cost several hundred dollars to make copies and apply the postage any time we conduct a mass mailing. Every newsletter sent by e-mail rather than snail-mail is a savings of at least \$3.00 per person!

Key to making our e-mail venture work will be the *Adobe Acrobat Reader*. This free software is available from the website www.adobe.com. Many of you already have it, and for those of you who don't it is easy to download and install. All you have to do is go to the Adobe website and "Get Acrobat Reader." You will be prompted for what type of system you have, etc., and then the download will begin. When the download is complete, the application installs in minutes.

Spanish Speaking Weekend!

During the November 2002 meeting of the Secretariat, a target timeframe of Fall 2004 was set for our first all Spanish weekend. While this may seem a long way off, it will be here before you know it! To meet the challenge of presenting a weekend in Spanish, many resources will be required.

To provide a little clarification, many Dioceses or Cursillo Centers have parallel Cursillo organizations based on language. For example, there may be an English element with its own School of Leaders, Secretariat, etc., and then the same setup for a Spanish element and possibly a Vietnamese element. We felt this type of structure would dilute an already small movement, so for now our approach is to remain the Catholic Cursillo of the Diocese of Knoxville in Tennessee, which happens to have weekends in English and Spanish and (?).

Region IV Fall Encounter

In late October, I attended the Region IV Fall Encounter in Little Rock, AR. It was held at the St. John Pastoral Center, the former St. John Seminary, which had been converted into an office complex for the Diocese of Little Rock. On site there were excellent facilities for retreats and conferences. The rooms we stayed in were private, clean, quiet and comfortable. The conference center had ample space for our large group meetings and worship services. This facility is used to host the Cursillo weekends for the Diocese of Little Rock, and the Cursillo has an office in the complex, which is staffed during regular business hours.





The theme of the weekend was "Letting the Light of Christ Shine." The format was much the same as the Cursillo weekend; a talk followed by small group discussion and time for private reflection. We also met for Morning and Evening prayer, Mass and Ultreya. The similarity ends there, as the pace of the Fall Encounter was much more relaxed and the atmosphere was much more of a family and Spiritual homecoming.

The Spanish-speaking element of the Little Rock Diocese was also with us, but they met separately for most of their talks and discussion. We did get together for a Bi-Lingual Mass, which was a real treat.

There were three main talks on the weekend; *Christ, Our Light* by Fr. Al Wilson, *Growing As Light* by Becky Guenthner, and *A Community of Light*, also by Becky. There were two workshops; *Living as Light* and *Sharing the Light*, conducted by members of the Regional Service Team. All were excellent, and very Spiritually refreshing.

A New Insight

As a result of attending the Cursillo Movement's 12th National Encounter in Louisville, KY this past July, I received new insights into several phases of our movement. One of the major goals Cursillo has set for itself is to have a positive influence on our environment. On Friday for the major address, Teresa Tomeo presented "Effecting the Media Environment, We can Make A Change". Teresa is a professional speaker, media consultant and broadcast-journalist from Detroit, MI, and currently hosts a daily talk show on Christian radio.

Teresa challenged each of us to use our "Power of One" to affect the quality of TV, CD's, the Internet, songs and talk shows on the radio, even the choice of magazines available in our school libraries. Every facet of the media influences our children and us! Sex and violence have become an accepted way of life, mainly because we see it on TV and the Internet, hear it on radio and CD's and magazine ads use it to appeal to the consumer.

A few statistics cited were:

- 75% of what is seen and heard encourages irresponsibility
- 3 out of 4 teenagers say pre-marital sex is OK
- TV in the bedroom encourages obesity
- 50% of what is seen on MTV encourages violence
- The average age of the viewer of pornography on the Internet is between 12 and 17 years old

Some of the ways we can bring about a change are:

- Write a letter to a local TV or radio station to protest a program we find objectionable. Every letter received represents 1000 listeners.
- Make a phone call to the program director or manager expressing our complaint.
- Let the sponsors of the program know we will no longer purchase their products.

Teresa has compiled a "Family Media Guide" that gives information on who to contact at the TV networks, helpful organizations and their web sites, suggestions for developing healthy media habits, internet filters, and how to deal with the media and alternative news sources. Go, But Leave the Calculator Behind!

In the December 8, 2002 edition, the *Chattanooga Times Free Press* ran an article by staff writer Sean
McCombs titled "*Church Attendance Study Analyzed*."
This article cited research done by the *Glenmary*

Research Center in Nashville, TN, indicating that the average church attendance in Tennessee is 51.1%. The article focused on Rhea County, which in spite of the John Scopes trial and some who considers Dayton, TN, to be the "center of Fundamentalism," the average attendance was only 45.4%. Bledsoe County was listed as having the lowest at 32.7%. The following summary was presented in the article. The Glenmary Research Center was cited as its source.

As I reflected on the article and the averages, I came to the conclusion that this may be a less than optimal way of looking at the church. To me, the focus seems to be that of a Field Of Dreams – we have built churches and they will attend, we have the averages to prove it. When we read about the early church in scripture, we are rarely provided with counts, generally we read words similar to "many believers were added" or "the church grew steadily in number." Perhaps this is a better focus – the early leaders of our church seem more interested in telling us about casting the net, rather than counting (or averaging) the numbers of believers they hauled in.

When we celebrated the Ascension of the Lord last May, our Gospel reading from Matthew (28:16-20) quoted Christ as saying "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold I am with you always, until the end of the age." Taking some liberty with this passage I would like to suggest the following might be our focus "Go, therefore, and evangelize your environments. Make friends. Be a

friend. Bring your friends to Christ. And behold I am with you always in your Holiness, Formation and Spiritual Direction." Paraphrasing Mother Teresa "We are not called to be successful, only faithful."

Go, therefore, and leave your report forms and calculators at home.



National Encounter 2002

On July 14, Butch and Mary Beth Feldhaus, Marianne Hartman and I traveled to the 12th National Cursillo Encounter at Bellarmine University in Louisville, Kentucky. Smiles, camaraderie and helpful people greeted us.

After finding our dorms and assigned rooms, we proceeded to dinner and shared meals with other Cursillistas. Our group shared one meal with Jorge Barcelo, the National Spanish-speaking Coordinator and talked about what our diocese could do to start a Spanish-speaking Cursillo.

At the gathering in the Field House we learned that this Encounter would be translated in both English and Spanish via individual headsets for the first time.

Friday began like most weekends--- early...at 6:30 for breakfast and as on Cursillo Weekends there was no lack good food.

The major presentation followed morning prayers. The keynote speaker was Teresa Tomeo, a broadcast-journalist with 20 years experience in the Detroit radio and TV market. She currently is a professional speaker and media consultant and hosts a daily talk show on a Christian radio station in Detroit. She provided valuable instructions on how to positively influence today's media.

Each day we celebrated Eucharist together and it was soul-stirring for me to see the procession and recession of many priests, deacons, several bishops and the Archbishop from Louisville. A count after a Mass revealed 758 years of priesthood present and concelebrating.

On Friday each of us attended a different Workshop, mine was on the 3 Days. One of the interesting topics for me was about how our weekend schedule can help the candidates understand the message of the \mathfrak{J}^{rd} Day. On Friday Bishop Roman of Miami did a major presentation on Social Justice.

Saturday we were divided into groups according to our last names and we participated in a Synod. I must admit the title and idea scared me! There were 6 areas for discussion and there were sessions in English and Spanish. We started as a large group of 30 to 40 and then divided into groups of 10 to 15 and discussed given information, then we divided into 2's and then reversed the procedure, finally presenting the main points of the group discussion to the large group. Ultimately the information will be used by National to develop diocesan Pastoral Plans.

We attended a Fiesta Saturday evening and really enjoyed celebrating. The highlight of the evening was the informal songs, learning Spanish songs, singing by a group of priests and Teresa Tomeo teaching the priests the Macarena.

It felt so good to be part of such a wonderful happy group and if you can, plan to attend next years Encounter. It will be held on July 17 to 21 in Cincinnati. Any Cursillista is welcome, so make plans now. This will be the last year for a while that it is held in the Midwest. It is a heartwarming experience!

First Ecumenical Ultreya in Tennessee Held in Crossville

On Sunday afternoon, July 28th, the Holy Spirit brought five Christian groups together in fellowship and praise. St. Alphonsus Catholic Church on Sparta drive hosted the first ecumenical 'Ultreya' in the state of Tennessee and perhaps in the United States. Approximately 65-70 Christians from several faith traditions gathered in the social hall of St. Alphonsus to share their love of Christ with one another.

Father Patrick Brownell, pastor of St. Alphonsus Catholic Church welcomed the attendees to what he hoped would be an on-going dialogue of sharing.



Five Christian faith traditions were represented at this 'Grand Ultreya': Methodist, Lutheran, Baptist, Episcopal, and Catholic. Each man and woman present respecting the faith traditions of the others while knowing their love of Christ is central to their beliefs. They shared songs of praise, life-changing moments, prayer and light refreshments. Deacon Joe Solis of St. Alphonsus closed the program with a prayer of thanksgiving. All the participants enjoyed the afternoon and plans were made for another ecumenical 'Ultreya' to take place in the fall to be hosted by Holly Neal and the Walk to Emmaus group.



As I walked among the gathering, people were heard to remark, "This is wonderful!", "You can see God is working in our lives here in Crossville" and "This is just the beginning!". The general atmosphere was joyful and smiles were in abundance. When the two hour gathering was over, new friendships were in place.

In what appeared on the surface to be a chance encounter at the golf course, an idea took hold and began to form. Sue Heath, a Catholic from St.

Alphonsus and Peggy Nicolas from the Lutheran Church at Fairfield Glade realized they both had something more in common than golf. They both had had a personal encounter with Christ on a weekend known as a Cursillo. This "chance" meeting was the beginning of an ecumenical gathering among five different Christian churches here in Crossville. The Holy Spirit is definitely present in Crossville!

Once the idea took hold, others began to get excited about it and work toward their joint goal. Instrumental in making this afternoon happen were also Holly Neal from First Methodist Church, with the Walk to Emmaus group, Ken Deadmon from the Non-denominational Church in Lake Tansi, with Tres Dios and Irene Wired from St. Raphael Episcopal Church. Monica Mowdy from First Methodist Church contributed her talents on the guitar to provide music for the afternoon gathering.

Fr. George P. Landry traveled from Sparta to take part in this historic event. Fr. Landry works primarily with the Kairos program, which is the movement's prison ministry.

Cursillo (pronounced kur-see-yo) is a Spanish word meaning short course. The Cursillo movement began in Spain and spread to the United States primarily in the Hispanic Communities at first and then throughout the Christian denominations with each group adapting their own name. The Catholics refer to this encounter weekend as Cursillo, while the Lutherans call theirs Via de Christo. The Methodists have the 'Walk to Emmaus', the 'Tres Dios' group is non-denominational, and the Episcopal Church follows the Cursillo (almost identical to the Catholics).

These encounter weekends usually begin on Thursday evening and end the following Sunday afternoon. During the three days, those attending live and work together listening to talks given by clergy and laity. They also share Eucharist, prayer and fellowship. The titles of the talks for the Catholic Cursillo indicate their content: Ideal, Grace, Laity, Faith, Holiness, Formation, the Sacraments, Evangelization, Obstacles to Grace, Leaders, Evangelization of the Environment, Christian Life, Christian Community, and Group Reunion. The other groups have similar talks with different titles. Each talk is followed by a discussion period. According to the National Cursillo Center pamphlet, the goal of the movement is that Christ be the prime influence in society. So it is said that the primary objectives of the Cursillo Movement are to develop in adult Christians a

consciousness of their power and mission to become leaders in the work of Christian renewal, and to sustain them as they provide a Christian leaven in civic, social and economic life. This "Christianizing of environments" is what the Cursillo Movement is all about.



In the Cursillo Movement, the community spirit is continued after the three-day weekend through the Ultreya (which is Spanish for "onward") or reunions of the community. These Ultreyas usually take place once a month as a means of growth, support, and enthusiasm within the community.

The School Of Leaders

From the Cursillo Leaders' Manual, we learn that The School of Leaders is the Reunion and Ultreya of the leaders of the Cursillo Movement. It is the working arm of the Secretariat and provides a place for the continuing growth and understanding of the Church and the Movement, for those who have taken the success of the Cursillo Movement as their own responsibility.

Don't let the title "School of Leaders" fool you into thinking this may not be something for you. Once again, going to our Cursillo Leaders Manual, the *School of Leaders* is the English rendition of "escuela de dirigentes." While "escuela" is literally translated as school, it carries the connotation of leaders as a group, as well as the connotation of a gathering of these leaders on a regular basis. In the past, the School of Leaders was referred to as Leader's School, but was changed to School of Leaders to emphasize it as a gathering of leaders (think of a school of fish) rather than something like a Driving School - a place where people go to learn to drive. As Cursillistas, we are already leaders - the School of Leaders is where we gather to facilitate our growth.

Perhaps the following three questions will help you decide if you should attend:

- 1. Are you seeking continual improvement in yourself?
- 2. Are you seeking continual improvement in the Cursillo Movement?
- 3. Are you seeking continual improvement in the environments in which you find yourself?

Did you answer "yes" to any or all of these? If you did, perhaps the School of Leaders is something you should seriously consider. You may have noticed that the following questions were not on the list:

- 1. Are you a member of the Secretariat?
- 2. Are you an Ultreya Leader?
- 3. Are you on a team in formation for a weekend?
- 4. Do you want to be a member of the Secretariat, a weekend team or an Ultreya leader?

While it would be very important for persons who might answer "yes" to these questions to attend the School of Leaders, it is not the primary reason.




